
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Sultan Amir Ahmad Bathhouse; Gorgeous Ancient Spa in Iran

Sultan Amir Ahmad Bathhouse is a traditional public bathhouse in Kashan, Isfahan province in central Iran is a masterpiece of Iranian architecture.

P:4 Built during the Safavid era, the bathhouse suffered damage in 1778 as a result of an earthquake and was renovated during the Qajar era. It underwent restoration in 1996. The bathhouse is named after Imamzadeh Sultan Amir Ahmad, whose mausoleum is located nearby. With an area of approximately 1,000 square meters, the bathhouse consists of two main parts: the dressing hall (Sarbineh) and the hot bathing hall (Garmkhaneh). Sarbineh is past the main entrance. It is a large octagonal hall with an octagonal pool in the middle, surrounded by eight pillars separating its outer sitting area. At the time of its construction, it was meant to not just improve cleanliness, but rather as a place for rest, gatherings, discussions and even prayers.

There are benches surrounding the perimeter of Sarbineh elevated by a few steps above the central pool where visitors can lounge. Garmkhaneh is the main washing area with hot and cold pools and sitting areas. There are four pillars in Garmkhaneh, which separate smaller, private bathrooms all around as well as the entrance to the main bathroom (Khazineh).



The closely-watched indicator, which often accounts for a meager share of the oil-dependent country's economic growth, has in recent years become a touchstone for measuring the level at which the economy is running on the right track. CBI Governor Valiollah Seif had earlier put the country's economic growth for the current fiscal year (ending March 20) at 5%, indicating that the share of non-oil growth would be significant in the absence of the enormous uptick in oil exports that drove the 2016-17 growth. In that year, on the back of an oil export resurgence triggered by sanctions relief, the country achieved a 12.5% GDP growth.

The upbeat CBI forecast on its website marks the bank's performance in the 11 months leading to Feb. 1 on the occasion of the 39th anniversary of the Islamic Revolution.

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Washington Seeking **Revenge On Pahlavi Regime's Overthrow: UsAnalyst**



An American political commentator said the US government is still seeking to harm the Islamic Republic of Iran in revenge for the overthrow of the "puppet regime" of Mohammad Reza Pahlavi, the last monarch of Iran, back in 1979.

"Historically, the United States has wanted to punish Iran for deposing its puppet and creating the humiliation of the hostage crisis. That led to using Saddam Hussein as the US proxy in his eight-year long war with Iran," E. Michael Jones, a political analyst in the US state of Indiana, told the Tasnim News Agency on the occasion of the 39th anniversary of the 1979 Islamic Revolution, which put an end to the ruling of the US-backed Pahlavi regime in Iran. Eugene Michael Jones is an American writer, former professor, media commentator and the current editor of Culture Wars magazine.

"Anything that creates a distraction from Washington's prime objective in Iran is viewed as a loss for Trump's regional policy in the Persian Gulf," Entessar told.

A summit with the participation of the Emir of Qatar, crown prince of Saudi Arabia and crown prince of the UAE is to be held in the United States in May about the Oatar crisis. Does this mean the end of disputes between these countries? Not necessarily. The meeting is designed as

a first step to gauge methods by which the Qatar crisis may be addressed. Of course, the Trump administration will seek to interject US interests in the discussion and will try to micro-manage the proceedings to strengthen US interests.

US Secretary of State Tillerson has said that the negative consequences of the Persian Gulf regional crises are not only limited to the Arab countries but also they include the United States. What kind of losses is he referring to?

Essentially what Secretary Tillerson was referring to was the weakening of the Arab bloc against Iran and the loosening of Washington's iron grip on

developments in the Persian Gulf. The Trump administration's overriding concern is to weaken Iran and, ultimately, bring about a regime change in the country. Anything that creates a distraction from Washington's prime objective in Iran is viewed as a loss for Trump's regional policy in the Persian Gulf.

Oatari Foreign Minister Mohammed bin Abdul Rahman al-Thani said that Qatar is ready to attend the meeting. But he argued that Doha would not be willing to accept the pre-conditions and also demanded resolution of the crisis on the basis of equality between countries. Is this possible?

If the 13 conditions that Saudi Arabia and its allies announced last year are viewed as non-negotiable points, then the Qatari crisis will not be resolved. However, if the Saudi-led Arab protagonists are willing to indeed negotiate with Qatar on the basis of equality and desist from treating Qatar as a



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wayward child that needs to be disciplined, then the crisis with Qatar may be resolvable.

Which of the 13 terms announced by

Saudi Arabia and its allies may Qatar have to swallow?

Saudi Arabia, or more specifically Mohammad bin Salman (MbS), is fanatically obsessed with Iran. So, I think the first of the 13 conditions, namely scaling down Qatari-Iranian relations and calibrating them along the Saudi-UAE lines as dictated by MbS remains the most important item that Qatar may have to concede. This is where the Trump Administration's heavy hand will be used to try to bludgeon Qatar into submission.

The International Monetary Fund in its latest review of Iran's economy predicted growth to reach 4.2% in 2017-18, which it said would be sustained or even rise to 4.5% over the medium term, if the financial sector reform takes hold. In its report, CBI also notes that the median growth for the country in the past four years (with Hassan Rouhani at the head of the government) has been 3.3%--a noteworthy development after successive years of lackluster growth or contraction registered by the previous administration.

The bank also notes that its monetary easing program of helping buoy the working capital of enterprises, especially of small- and mediumsized ones, has had a major impact on attaining positive growth rates.

According to the bank in the first half of the current year to Sept. 22, economic growth has been 4.5%, with the non-oil sector accounting for 4.1%. It noted that during H1, all the main economic sectors have had a positive value added, including agriculture at 2%, oil at 4%, industries and mines at 4.5% and services sector at 3.8%.

Currency Market Volatility

Another point again emphasized by CBI in its recent report is stability in the foreign exchange market in the past few years, despite the occasional volatility. The bank said providing hard currency to importers and reducing the waiting period for it have been among its achievements.

It notes that the foreign exchange rate has had had little fluctuations in the open market, evidenced by the fact that the rial was quoted at 36,440 in 2016 to the dollar having weakened by 5.6% compared with the previous year while it averaged at 39,275 rials in the 10 month to Jan. 20–down by 8.8% at an annualized rate.

The rial is now hovering above the psychological barrier of 46,000 to the USD, having weakened to record lows repeatedly in the past few weeks before gaining some ground after the CBI

launched a large-scale intervention. In late January, the rial dropped to around 46,500 against the dollar in the open market from 37,700 in mid-2017. This was particularly shocking, considering the Rouhani administration's policy of keeping the rial strong. Although the inflation rate climbed back into the doubledigit territory in January–a factor the CBI mainly traces to the boom in the housing sector, a weakening rial and the surge in liquidity–the banks hopes that with continued monetary and fiscal discipline, achieving single-digit inflation will again become a possibility.




Iranian MPs continue discussing next year's budget bill



◆TSE, IFB Benchmarks Slide in Weekly Trade

Iran's stock market was down on all fronts last week, as systematic risks, sliding oil and base metal prices coupled with heavy sales by institutional investors, and a further rial devaluation prevented Tehran Stock Exchange's benchmark index from crossing the psychological 100,000 barrier and sapped Iran Fara Bourse's growth.

Turkey, with a 22% share in Iraq's foreign trade, is Baghdad's top trade partner followed by China with a 20% and Iran with a 16% share, the chairman of Trade Promotion Organization of Iran said.

Mojtaba Khosrotaj made the announcement during the Sixth Iran-Iraq Economic Expansion Meeting held in Mashhad Province. According to the official, food exports constituted 19% of Iran's non-oil exports to Iraq in the past three years followed by agro products (15%), chemical products (15%), energy products (11%), construction materials (10%), machinery and vehicles (5%), home appliances (4%), textiles (3%) and other products (18%), Financial Tribune reported.


There are benches surrounding the perimeter of Sarbineh elevated by a few steps above the central pool where visitors can lounge. Garmkhaneh is the main washing area with hot and cold pools and sitting areas. There are four pillars in Garmkhaneh, which separate smaller, private bathrooms all around as well as the entrance to the main bathroom (Khazineh).

The interior of the bathhouse is decorated with turquoise and gold tilework, plasterwork, brickwork as well as artistic paintings. Most of the decorations of the bathhouse's interior are in Sarbineh.

Its temperature is slightly warm to avoid a drastic temperature change when entering or exiting the facilities. The area connecting Sarbineh and Garmkhaneh was intentionally designed with multiple turns to minimize the exchange of heat

and humidity between the two areas. The roof of the bathhouse is made of multiple domes that contain convex glasses to provide sufficient lighting to the bathhouse while concealing it from the outside.

The bathhouse has other supporting areas as well, which were utilized for regulating the amount of water and its temperature.



The collection of historical houses belongs to the eras from Safavid to Qajar is in Isfahan, which most of them have been destroyed unfortunately and a few numbers of those historical old houses are still remained as historical sites of Isfahan.

In the past, the bathhouse was used as a traditional teahouse. Today, it serves as amuseum.

In 1956, the Sultan Amir Ahmad Bathhouse was registered as a national

heritage by Iran's Cultural Heritage, Handicrafts and Tourism Department. Why go there?



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
